

United Nations Summer Camp: Sustainable Development Goals in Action Monday, July 26 – Friday, July 30, 2021 Virtual Program – Draft Brief Agenda

The **2021 United Nations Summer Camp:** *Sustainable Development Goals in Action*, is a weeklong virtual summer camp for middle school students interested in learning about global affairs through the work of the United Nations. The program will give student participants an opportunity to participate in interactive expert briefings, games, and activities, while honing key skills and collaborating with their peers along the way. Participants will step into the shoes of diplomats as they work together to study the United Nations Sustainable Development Goals, learn public speaking tips and strategies, and make new friends, all while having fun. The Council's virtual United Nations Summer Camp will provide students with a mix of live and asynchronous instruction and will end with an action-oriented final program day, guaranteed to empower students with the tools necessary to be agents of change in their schools and local communities. This program welcomes all students in grades 6-8, regardless of their familiarity with the United Nations or Model United Nations.

<u>Monday, July 26:</u> Introduction to United Nations and Sustainable Development Goals

After students are grouped into their SDG Study Teams, students will also be assigned a country to focus their SDG studies on throughout the rest of the week, culminating in the final group activities on Friday.
