What is Parliamentary Procedure?



A set of rules that run when & how people speak in meetings

Used by: Model United Nations, United States Congress,
 Student Government, City Council, Places of Worship, etc.



Why do we use Parliamentary Procedure?



- Quicker meetings
- Keeps delegates on track
- Protects each member's rights

- Everyone's voice is heard
- Fairness (will of the majority)
- Respect



What does Parliamentary Procedure sound like?



Placard

Piece of paper a delegate raises when they want to speak



Roll Call

Calling a list of names to know who is present



Chair

Person who runs Model UN meeting and makes sure parli pro is followed



Speakers List

A list of country delegations who want to speak



Caucus

A meeting about a specific issue



Moderated Caucus

Debate using speakers' list



Unmoderated Caucus

Debate that does not use speakers' list.

Delegates can talk with each other and move around the room!



Points

Questions or concerns a delegate can raise

There are 3 types of points!



1. Point of Order

Use this if someone breaks parli pro rules



2. Point of Inquiry

Use this if you have a question



3. Point of Personal Privilege

Use this if you feel uncomfortable (example: you need to use the restroom)



- **4. Motions**: A proposal by a delegate that the committee takes a certain action. Examples:
 - Motion to open and/or close a committee session
 - Motion for lunch
 - Motion for a moderated caucus
 - Motion for an unmoderated caucus

Resolution!



What is a

Resolution?



- A written statement that recommends actions to be taken on an important issue
- Each country delegation writes a resolution about their topic

Let's take a look at a sample resolution!



Student Council Policy Issue: Bullying in School

Committee: World Affairs Middle School Administration

Topic: Bullying

Sponsor: Students

Heading

School Administration,

Concerned that 22 percent of students between ages 12 - 18 have been victims of bullying,

Alarmed that nearly half of teenagers have been cyberbullied,

Understanding that 54 percent of children who are bullied do not tell an adult in the school,

- 1. <u>Urges</u> World Affairs Middle School to adopt bullying education programs to teach students how to be upstanders to bullying;
- 2. <u>Encourages</u> World Affairs Middle School to teach students safe online behavior and how to report cyberbullying;
- 3. <u>Recommends</u> that World Affairs Middle School train school staff on how to recognize signs of bullying and support students who might be victims of bullying.

Preambulatory Clauses: Just the Facts

Use reliable sources!

Examples: U.N. Charter, other U.N. resolutions, Sustainable Development Goals



Preambulatory Clauses: Format

Italicize first few words of each clause

Use a comma (,) at the end of each clause

Part III: Operative Clauses

Suggest actions: What should be done to solve the problem?



Operative Clauses: Get Buy-In

Make Your Solution:

Realistic

Specific

Enforceable



Operative Clauses: Format

- Begin with an action word
- Underline first action word or words
- End first 2 clauses with semicolon (;)

- End last clause with period (.)
- Number each clause (1, 2, 3)

Data on digital skills is available only in 78 countries






Practice: Preambulatory Clauses



Amend: to change or make better




When to Amend a Resolution

- Only operative clauses can be amended
- Amend a clause if it need to be more:
 - Specific

Agreeable to other countries

Clear



How to Amend a Resolution

Add words or phrases

Combine operative clauses

 Delete words or phrases

Students' School: World Affairs Council Middle School

U.N. Committee (either 1 or 2): 1

Topic: Clean Water and Sanitation

Sponsor (country delegation): Dominican Republic

The General Assembly,

Deeply concerned that 250 million children worldwide are out of school,

Fully aware that Latin America and the Caribbean had some of the longest school closures due to Covid-19,

Keeping in mind that in the Dominican Republic, school drop out rates are twice as high in rural areas,

- 1. Suggests that the United Nations build schools in rural areas of the Dominican Republic
- 2. Suggests that the United Nations help more children go to school
- 3. Suggests that wealthy nations give money to countries in Latin America and the Caribbean to help their schools



Q: What are the 3 main parts of a resolution?

A: Heading, Preambulatory Clauses, Operative Clauses



Q: Which punctuation marks are used in preambulatory & operative clauses?

A: Commas in preambulatory clauses, semicolons and 1 period at the end operative clauses.
