## DISTINGUISHED GUEST LECTURER

### ADMIRAL WILLIAM J. FALLON

United States Navy (Retired)



#### Admiral William J. Fallon

retired from the U.S. Navy after a distinguished 40 year career of military and strategic leadership. He has led U.S. and Allied forces in eight separate commands and played a leadership role in military and diplomatic matters at the highest levels of the U.S. government.

As head of U.S. Central Command, Admiral Fallon

directed all U.S. military operations in the Middle East, Central Asia and Horn of Africa, focusing on combat efforts in Iraq and Afghanistan. He led the U.S. Pacific Command for two years, directing political-military activities in the Asia-Pacific region. His achievements include a resumption of military engagement with China, new outreach to India, a new agreement on a strategic framework with Japan, and humanitarian assistance to the victims of the 2004 Tsunami in SE Asia. He also served as Presidential Envoy to Japan, handling bi-lateral relations after the collision of a U.S. submarine and a Japanese fishing vessel.

On September 11, 2001, Admiral Fallon was serving in the Pentagon as Vice Chief of the Navy. He personally directed the recovery of the Navy staff in the wake of the attack and led in the planning of the retaliatory attacks on Al Qaeda and Taliban forces in Afghanistan. He later commanded the U.S. Atlantic Fleet and U.S. Fleet Forces Command, with responsibility for the readiness of U.S. Naval forces worldwide.

Admiral Fallon began his Navy career as a combat aviator flying from an aircraft carrier during the Vietnam War and participated in many vital U.S. military operations during the Cold War. He led a Carrier Air Wing in combat during the Gulf War of 1991, and commanded a Navy Battle Group and the U.S. 6th Fleet Battle Force during NATO military operations in Bosnia.

Admiral Fallon was a Robert E. Wilhelm Fellow at the Massachusetts Institute of Technology, Center for International Studies. He serves on the Global Affairs Advisory Board of Occidental College and the Advisory Board of the Institute for the Study of Diplomacy at Georgetown University. He is a graduate of Villanova University, the U.S. Naval War College, the National War College, and has an MA in International Studies from Old Dominion University.

Admiral Fallon is a Senior Fellow at the Center for Naval Analyses and has been a member of an Experts Panel to the Congressional Commission on the Strategic Posture of the U.S. and served as Co-Chair of the Center for Strategic and International Studies Commission on Smart Global Health Policy and Co-Chair of the National Association of Corporate Directors 2009 Blue Ribbon Commission on Risk Management. He is a member of the U.S. Secretary of Defense Science Board and the Board of the American Security Project.

# THE 152-GUEST EXPEDITION CRUISE SHIP **VEGA**

Built in Finland and launched in July 2022, Swan Hellenic's *Vega* is a new-generation expedition cruise ship. Although at 10,250 tons the ship is large enough to accommodate more than 250 passengers, *Vega* will accommodate a maximum of 152 guests in 76 spacious staterooms and balcony suites. The low guest density results in one of the most generous indoor and outdoor space-to-guest ratios among cruise ships.

Featuring the latest advances in technology and engineering, *Vega* is among the world's first environmentally responsible ships. Equipped with hybrid engines and a unique water filtration system, *Vega* leaves a minimal footprint. For cruising in Polar regions, the ship meets the stringent requirements of the new Polar Code with its high PC5 Category A ice-strengthened hull and other advanced features. A computer-controlled Dynamic Positioning System allows the ship to maintain position without anchoring. Operated by a complement of 120 experienced European officers and international crew members, *Vega* will

carry a fleet of Zodiacs, versatile landing boats, and kayaks. Powerful stabilizers provide a smooth ride.

*Vega's* interior spaces exude sophisticated elegance, with most rooms opening to panoramic views of the sea. All staterooms and suites face outside and are equipped with private facilities, climate control, TV, Wi-Fi and USB connections, and other amenities. Of the ship's 76 staterooms, 60 have balconies. Public areas include a spacious observation lounge equipped with state-of-the-art facilities for lectures and presentations; a club lounge; a restaurant that accommodates all guests at one seating; an outdoor café/bar that surrounds the heated swimming pool; a wellness area with gym, spa, and sauna with an adjoining outdoor jacuzzi; library; beauty salon; and an infirmary that is attended by a full-time doctor and nurse. The ship also features expansive open-deck areas. Two elevators connect all decks. Attentive service is provided on a 24-hour basis. The outstanding cuisine is complemented by fine wines at lunch and dinner.

**Wednesday, May 19, 2027**

## **DEPART THE US/ARRIVE HALIFAX, Nova Scotia, Canada**

Outbound flights to Halifax Stanfield International Airport. The picturesque capital of Nova Scotia has a European-influenced charm accented by modern vitality that provides an excellent start to your journey. Upon arrival, transfer to the *Sutton Place Hotel* (or similar) for one night. Meet your fellow travelers, Admiral Fallon and the trip director over a welcome dinner. (D)

**Thursday, May 20**

## **HALIFAX/EMBARK**

Take in Halifax's highlights on a guided tour. Begin in the urban oasis of the Public Gardens. Continue to Province House, Canada's longest-serving legislative building, and the Maritime Museum of the Atlantic. Round out the morning with a visit to the star-shaped Citadel to admire its commanding view over the lively waterfront and Halifax Harbor. In the early afternoon, transfer to the pier and embark *Vega*. Enjoy lunch onboard and settle into your staterooms as the ship sails northeast. (B, L, D)

**Friday, May 21**

## **AT SEA**

During this day at sea, attend lectures and briefings from Guest Lecturer Admiral Fallon and *Vega's* expert expedition staff; relax and enjoy cruising the open sea; and treat yourself to some of the ship's many amenities. (B, L, D)

**Saturday, May 22**

## **ST. JOHN'S, Newfoundland & Labrador, Canada**

*Vega* arrives in St. John's, capital of the Newfoundland & Labrador province and one of the oldest European settlements in North America. Enjoy a tour of the downtown area for a taste of the port's maritime culture and heritage. Take in historic landmarks like Water Street, lined with warehouses once connected to the fishing industry and now converted to charming shops and galleries, as well as the colorful Victorian houses of Jellybean Row. Later, transfer via coach to historic Signal Hill for panoramic harbor views. Return to the ship and sail in the early evening. (B, L, D)

**Sunday, May 23 & Monday, May 24**

## **DAYS AT SEA**

Crossing the Labrador Sea and the Davis Strait, enjoy *Vega's* comforts, take in talks and discussions with your guest lecturer and the ship's expedition staff, and relax as you cruise the Labrador Sea onward to Greenland's shores. (B, L, D)

**Tuesday, May 25**

## **NANORTALIK, Greenland**

Greenland's southernmost town offers both natural and cultural wonders. Otherworldly blue-tinted icebergs and peaks in majestic Tasermiut Fjord comprise incredible views, while the nearby Qingua Valley presents an intriguing anomaly as the only natural forest in Greenland. Nanortalik's excellent open-air museum also provides insight into the cultural history and lives of the native Inuit peoples, as well as Old Norse and later Danish colonists. (B, L, D)

**Wednesday, May 26**

## **QASSIARSUK/NARSAQ, Greenland**

The stark landscape of Tunulliarfik Fjord surrounds the small settlement of Qassiarsuk. The primary draw against this dramatic

backdrop is the thousand-year-old UNESCO World Heritage site of Brattahlíð, originally the homestead of Viking explorer Erik the Red. Despite the fjord's harsh appearance, it remains a surprisingly fertile region and an important center of Greenlandic sheep farming. Explore Brattahlíð's ruins, then continue to the lovely, colorful town of Narsaq to enjoy local activities and expansive wild vistas. (B, L, D)

Thursday, May 27

#### **IGALIKU/HVALSEY/IGALIKU**

Part of the extensive, UNESCO-listed Viking area of Kujataa, Igaliku is home to an ancient bishopric and the archaeological remains of the cathedral of Garðar. Visit the site and nearby modern church, which shed light on the Norse history of the area. Explore also the ruins of Hvalsø Church, site of the last documented Norse event – a wedding in 1408 AD – before their mysterious disappearance from Greenland. With its local Inuit community of sheep farmers, today's Igaliku is one of the few places in Greenland to revolve around an agricultural economy, and there may be an opportunity to sample local products or enjoy the hiking opportunities that surround the town. (B, L, D)

Friday, May 28

#### **QAQORTOQ**

Vibrantly painted buildings rise from the sea in tiers, silhouetted against craggy slopes in Qaqortoq, considered the cultural nexus of South Greenland. Evidence of human habitation here stretches back over 4,000 years to the Paleo-Eskimo Saqqaq people. The Dorset people arrived around 800 B.C., long before the 10th century AD arrival of the Norse. This quintessential Greenlandic town and its spectacular surrounding landscape provide a fitting close to exploration of the region. (B, L, D)

Saturday, May 29 & Sunday, May 30

#### **DAYS AT SEA**

During these final two days at sea, relax with *Vega's* amenities and edify yourself with talks and discussions with your guest lecturer and the ship's expedition staff as you cruise the open sea toward Iceland. Be sure to keep your eyes open for wildlife! On the evening of May 30, bid your group safe travels over a farewell dinner. (B, L, D)

Monday, May 31

#### **REYKJAVÍK, Iceland/DISEMBARK/FLIGHTS HOMEWARD**

Arrive this morning in Reykjavík, Iceland's compact capital city. Disembark *Vega* after breakfast onboard and transfer to the Keflavík International Airport for flights homeward. Alternatively, continue your journey with an optional 2-day extension in Reykjavík. (B)

## **REYKJAVÍK POST-EXTENSION MAY 31 – JUNE 2, 2027**



Monday, May 31

#### **REYKJAVÍK/THINGVELLIR NATIONAL PARK/ GEYSIR GEOTHERMAL AREA/REYKJAVÍK**

Disembark and explore the natural wonders surrounding Reykjavík. Thingvellir National Park, part of Iceland's stunning Golden Circle, contains the geologically significant Reykjanes Ridge where the North American and Eurasian continental plates are actively being pulled apart by tectonic forces. This UNESCO World Heritage site is also legislatively important: the Icelandic Parliament or Alþingi was founded here in 930 AD and is recognized today as one of the oldest national parliaments in the world. Continue to 100-foot high Gullfoss Waterfall and the Geysir Geothermal Area, where the Strokkur Geyser erupts impressively every 10-15 minutes. Following a group lunch at a local restaurant, return to Reykjavík and check in to the Iceland Parliament Hotel (or similar) for a two-night stay. (B, L)

Tuesday, June 1

#### **REYKJAVÍK**

Depart the hotel on a walking tour of Reykjavík's historic sites. The marvelous collection at the National Museum of Iceland, which encompasses everything from ancient artifacts to modern art, is a special highlight. Gather for a farewell dinner tonight. (B, D)

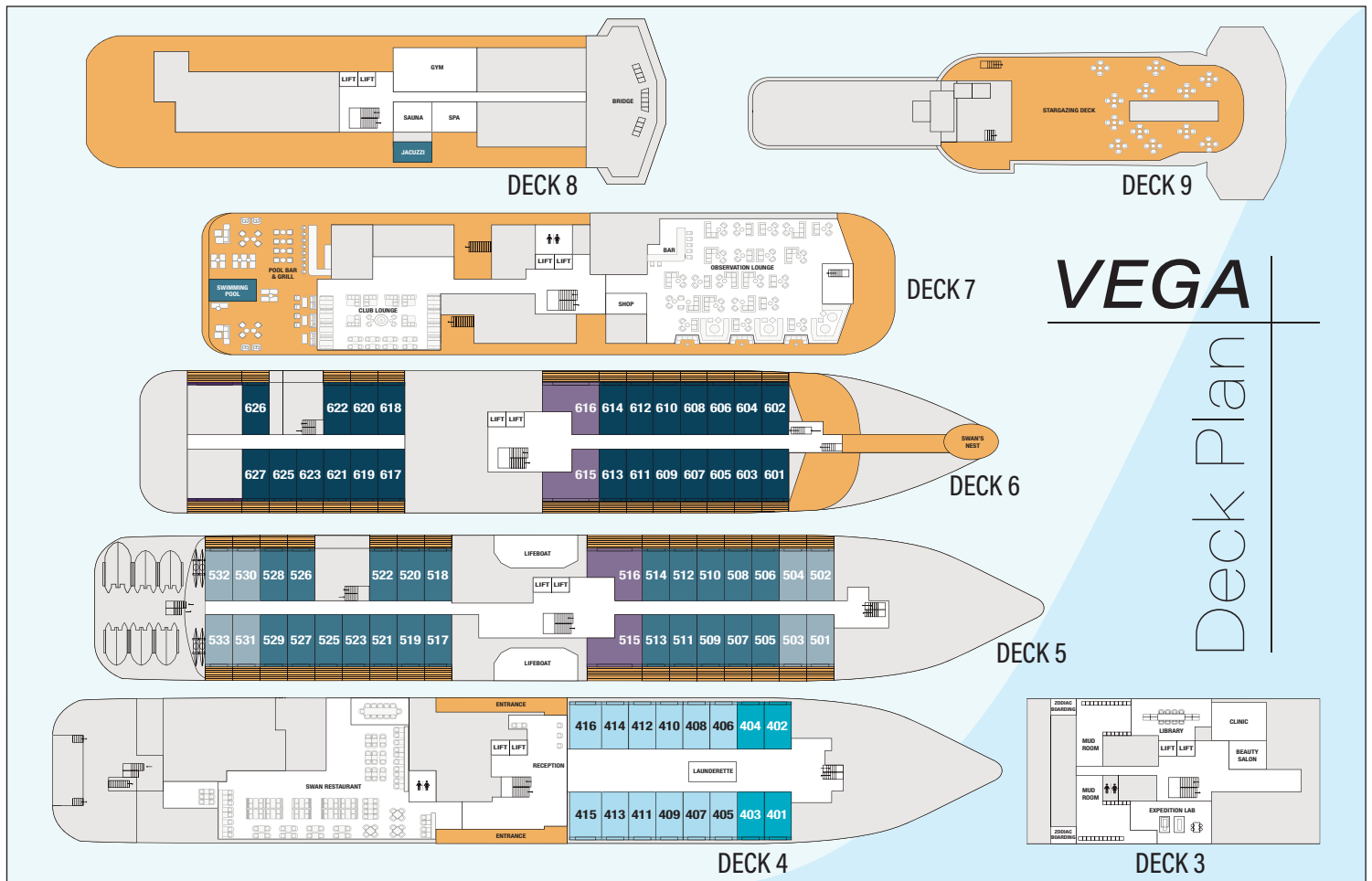
Wednesday, June 2

#### **REYKJAVÍK/FLIGHTS HOMEWARD**

After breakfast at the hotel, transfer to the Keflavík International Airport for flights homeward. (B)

## ACTIVITY LEVEL

Travelers can expect an estimated total of 1-3 hours of walking per day. Going ashore may involve guided walks over inclined or uneven surfaces such as cobblestones, unpaved, slippery, or rocky paths, and steps without handrails, so an ability to navigate varied terrain and tolerate brief periods of standing is necessary. Embarking and disembarking from motor coaches will also be necessary. Expedition excursions may use motorized Zodiac boats, so balance and sure footing are important. Weather conditions may be cold and/or windy, so layered clothing and a spirit of adventure will help you get the most from this unforgettable experience.

Cancellations received 120 to 90 days pre-departure will be assessed a penalty equal to 20% of the total program cost per person. Cancellations received 89 to 61 days pre-departure will be assessed a penalty equal to 70% of the total program cost per person. Cancellations received within 60 days of departure are subject to 100% cancellation penalties. Requests for cancellations must be made in writing. No refunds will be made for any part of this program in which one chooses not to participate.
